
December Happenings

Tracking proposed changes to the Pa. Constitution

Voters could be flooded with proposed changes to the Pa Constitution in 2023.

Amending the constitution, though cumbersome, does not involve the governor. Instead, proposed constitutional amendments, after passing both chambers of the General Assembly two sessions in a row, become referendum that voters can approve or reject in the following election. If a majority of voters approve an amendment — and it <u>survives any legal challenges</u> — it goes into effect and becomes part of the constitution.

Bell Ringers: Do you have 2 hours?

The North Hills Community Outreach (NHCO) Salvation Army Kettle Campaign begins on Friday, November 25 and runs through December 24, excluding Sundays.

Our branch has participated in past years and we are hoping we have members who will volunteer in this endeavor this year.

This year our branch will be standing with the kettles at McCandless Crossing and Walmart in Gibsonia.

Volunteers will ring the bells and accept financial donations in NHCO's kettles. Volunteers will sign up for 2-hour shifts from 10 am to 8 pm. We will be stationed at McCandless Crossing Mondays through Saturdays. The Walmart dates have not yet been determined.

McCandless Crossing bell ringers will be stationed outside on the sidewalk of Providence Blvd. between **Massage Envy** and **Style Encore** and facing **Convive Coffee**.



Walmart bell ringers will stand outside at the yellow spork (logo) at either entrance.

We'd like a minimum of 2 to 4 volunteers for each shift at each location.

Please register to volunteer. The money NHCO raises through this effort is used to directly assist people who come to NHCO for help. But we can only raise the money when a volunteer covers the shift.

Currently, NHCO is registering volunteers for McCandless Crossing. Once they have the dates and shifts scheduled for Walmart they will register volunteers at Walmart.

When should you take down the Christmas Tree?

We all know that one person who keeps their Christmas tree up for what feels like forever. While many of us are ready to pack away the decorations almost as quickly as the presents are unwrapped, others like to hold on to the magic a little longer. But what does Christmas tradition say for how long we should leave our tree up? Well, it's a lot longer than you may think.



The holidays and how each family celebrates tend to vary. We all have our own traditions and those drive how we move about the holiday. And that's why there's so much variation in how long someone's Christmas tree stays up. But, if you wanted to go by actual Christmas tradition, our decorated trees should stay up until January 6.

There are actually 12 days of Christmas, like the song. But this time period begins on December 25 and doesn't end when Santa has come and gone. Instead, the 12 days of Christmas go from December 25 through January 5.

According to Christian tradition, January 6 marks the day the three kings actually arrived in Bethlehem and signals the end of the Christmas celebrations," the publication reports.

Tradition says that January 6, also called The Feast of Epiphany, Three Kings Day, or The Twelfth Night, is the

earliest a tree should be taken down because that's the date that signals the end of the traditional celebrations.
