# **March Program**

# **'Exploring Mindfulness**"

**Description:** To live mindfully is to live in the moment and reawaken oneself to the present, rather than dwelling on the past or anticipating the future. To be mindful is to observe and label thoughts, feelings and sensations in the body in an objective manner. Mindfulness can therefore be a tool to avoid self-criticism and judgment while identifying and managing difficult emotions.

Mindfulness can be seen to encompass two key ingredients: <u>awareness and acceptance</u>. Awareness is the knowledge and ability to focus attention on one's inner processes and experiences, such as the experience of the present moment. Acceptance is the ability to observe and accept—rather than judge or avoid—those streams of thought.

What is the purpose of mindfulness?

The goal of mindfulness is to cultivate perspective on one's consciousness and identity that can bring greater peace mentally and relationally. Mindfulness may also be utilized in mindfulness-based therapy, to address stress, anxiety, or pain, and simply to become more relaxed.

This presentation is designed to provide an overview of mindfulness, and its principles and techniques. During the presentation, we will explore the historical roots of mindfulness, common mindfulness practices, and research on its benefits. The lecture is meant to be both informative and interactive. During the presentation, you will be invited to ask questions along the way and participate in guided mindfulness-based exercises.

#### **Lunch Bunch:**


Billy's Road House: <u>10150 Old Perry Hwy, Wexford 15090</u> (724) 934-1177

Serves American food: appetizer, soup, salads, flatbreads, burgers and sandwiches.




#### **Morning Book Group**



Seventeen-year-old Lenni Pettersson lives on the Terminal Ward at the Glasgow Princess Royal Hospital. Though the teenager has been told she's dying, she still has plenty of living to do. Joining the hospital's arts and crafts class, she meets the magnificent Margot, an 83-year-old, purple-pajama-wearing, fruitcake-eating rebel, who transforms Lenni in ways she never imagined.

As their friendship blooms, a world of stories opens for these unlikely companions who, between them, have been alive for one hundred years. Though their days are dwindling, both are determined to leave their mark on the world. With the help of Lenni's doting palliative care nurse and Father Arthur, the hospital's patient chaplain, Lenni and Margot devise a plan to create one hundred paintings showcasing the stories of the century they have lived—stories of love and loss, of courage and kindness, of unexpected tenderness and pure joy.

#### **Evening Book Group**



Mark Whitaker's Smoketown is a captivating portrait of this unsung community and a vital addition to the story of black America. It depicts how ambitious Southern migrants were drawn to a steel-making city on a strategic river junction; how they were shaped by its schools and a spirit of commerce with roots in the Gilded Age; and how their world was eventually destroyed by industrial decline and urban renewal. Whitaker takes readers on a rousing, revelatory journey—and offers a timely reminder that Black History is not all bleak.



### **Diversity**

#### **Equity vs. Equality**

Although these two words have the same root, they don't mean the same thing. They are often used interchangeably, even though they differ in meaning. Equality means everyone gets the same access to — or amount of — something. Equity, by contrast, is about everyone having equal access to what they need to be successful. And those needs can be quite different.

A good example of this is <u>Angus Maguire's images</u> of three children standing on boxes to watch a ballgame over the fence. In the first image, each of the children has one of the same-sized boxes: **equality**. However, because the children are different heights, the shortest child still can't see. In the second image, the tallest child, who doesn't need a box to see over the fence, gives theirs to the shortest of the children, enabling all of the children to see over the fence: **equity**! The key difference here is fairness in the distribution of resources (the boxes) to each child enabling them to all achieve their goal (seeing the game).

## **Public Policy**

#### **Ratify the Equal Rights Amendment**

It's hard to believe the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) was first introduced into Congress 100 years ago, with the goal of guaranteeing equal legal rights for men and women under the U.S. Constitution. By 1977, the ERA was ratified by 35 of the necessary 38 states. However, because Congress imposed an arbitrary deadline to complete ratification by 1982, the ERA could not become law when the final three states ratified it years later (Nevada in 2017, Illinois in 2018, and finally Virginia in 2020).



With your help, we can change that. On January 24, Sen. Cardin filed <u>S.J. Res. 4</u> to remove the ratification deadline. The Senate used a procedural move called Rule XIV to allow the bill to be added to the Senate calendar and brought for a vote, bypassing the Committee process. Soon after, on January 31, Rep. Pressley introduced a similar bill in the House (<u>H.J. Res. 25</u>). If passed, these measures would allow Nevada, Illinois and Virginia to count toward ratification, and the ERA would finally become the 28th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

Women can't wait for equality any longer. <u>Urge</u> Congress to support S.J. Res. 4/H.J. Res. 25! Celebrating the 30th Anniversary of the Family and Medical Leave Act.

Leave (FAMILY) Act, which would create a national self-funding paid family and medical leave insurance program. Women disproportionately bear the economic burden of taking time off to care for children or elderly family members, or they're forced to delay securing care for themselves or others because they cannot afford to use unpaid leave Congress must act now to better support workers and their families. The Biden Administration also announced new actions to advance women's economic security and improve family and medical leave, including supporting paid-leave efforts in the states and giving military personnel access to 12 weeks of paid leave.

Again this year, AAUW **endorsed** the Washington, D.C., Admission Act (H.R. 51/S. 51) to establish D.C. statehood. The bill was reintroduced in both chambers of Congress on January 9.

## **Women's History Month 2023**



The theme of this year's event is "Celebrating Women Who Tell Our Stories," which encourages the recognition of women, past and present, who have been active in all forms of media and storytelling including print, radio, TV, stage, screen, blogs, podcasts, news, and social media. This timely theme honors women in every community who have devoted their lives and talents to producing art and news, pursuing truth and reflecting society decade after decade. Women's History Month is a time to pause and celebrate women and their contributions throughout history.

In celebration of this year's Women's History Month, below are 4 notable women:

The women featured here have changed our world for the better with their storytelling prowess. From them we learn many lessons about storytelling, including these four truths...

#### There Is Never a Single Story

Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie, in her **TED Talk** viewed by millions, "The Danger of a Single Story," provides an important lesson for us all to understand: "there is never a single story."

#### Authentic & Vulnerable Stories Are Strongest

Hannah Gadsby is an award-winning comedian and notable public speaker. You may have seen her Netflix comedy specials, or her **TED Talk**, "Three ideas. Three contradictions. Or not." During her TED Talk she shared that authentic storytelling is an important tool in her craft and in life. She explains how storytelling creates new spaces, can take on new life, and can make connections that otherwise wouldn't have occurred:

#### **Stories Illuminate Future Possibilities**

Dr. Kizzmekia Corbett is most recently known for being the scientific lead for the Coronavirus Vaccines and Immunopathogenesis Team at the National Institutes of Health, and as a valued orator who communicates sophisticated scientific information about COVID-19 and vaccines in an easily digestible way. In an **interview with Black Enterprise** in the spring of 2020, Dr. Corbett shared a personal story. Not only has Dr. Corbett brought us life— literally through her work on the COVID-19 vaccine—but, she also gives life through her storytelling. This light bulb moment in which she sees her potential to become a scientist is inspiring, and could help others to see their own future possibilities.

#### **Stories About Transformation Can Heal**

Amanda Gorman the award-winning storyteller and poet, Gorman, the youngest inaugural poet in history, wrote and delivered her poem, "The Hill We Climb," at the 2021 Presidential Inauguration.

#### **Fun Dates in March**



#### March is packed with fun dates:

- March 8 is International Women's Day, which is a day that not only celebrates the achievements of women and the progress made toward women's rights, but also brings attention to ongoing struggles for equality around the world.
- **March 12** is the start of **Daylight Saving Time**, which begins at 2:00 A.M. that day. If your area observes it, don't forget to "spring forward" and set the clocks one hour ahead, or you may find yourself an hour late to everything!
- **March 14** Pi Day is celebrated around the world. Pi (Greek letter "π") is the symbol used in mathematics to represent a constant the ratio of the circumference of a circle to its diameter which is approximately 3.14159. Pi Day is an annual opportunity for math enthusiasts to recite the infinite digits of Pi, talk to their friends about math, and eat pie.
- March 15 is the <u>Ides of March</u>! Legend surrounds this ill-fated day. Beware the Ides of March!
- **March 17** is <u>St. Patrick's Day</u>. According to folklore, folks wear a shamrock on St. Patrick's Day because the saint used its three leaves to explain the Trinity.
- March 20 brings about the March equinox—also called the vernal or spring equinox in the Northern Hemisphere—marking the beginning of spring. In the Southern Hemisphere, this date marks the <u>autumnal equinox</u> and the beginning of fall. On this day, the Sun stands directly over Earth's equator.
- **March 22** marks the start of **Ramadan**, which begins at sundown on that day. In Islam, Ramadan is considered a holy month when a month-long, sunrise-to-sunset fast is observed.
- March 29-31 are known as the <u>Borrowing Days</u>. According to lore, the last three days of March have a reputation for being stormy.

### **March 15 is Equal Pay Day**

This symbolic day denotes how far into the year women must work to be paid what men were paid the previous year. This date is based on the latest U.S. Census figures showing that the average woman who works full time is paid on average just 83 percent of the typical man's pay.

- Asian American, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander Women's Equal Pay Day is May 3. Asian American and Pacific Islander women are paid 75 cents for every dollar paid to white men.
- **LGBTQIA+ Equal Pay Awareness Day** is June 15. Without enough data to make calculations, this day raises awareness about the wage gap experienced by LGBTQIA+ folks.
- **Moms' Equal Pay Day** is September 8. Moms are paid 58 cents for every dollar paid to dads.
- **Black Women's Equal Pay Day** is September 21. Black women are paid 58 cents for every dollar paid to white men.
- **Native Women's Equal Pay Day** is November 30. Native women are paid 51 cents for every dollar paid to white men.
- Latina's Equal Pay Day is December 8. Latinas are paid 54 cents for every dollar paid to white men.


