

- 2. The instructions for holding a branch voting event are in the attached pdf. If you decide to hold branch voting, announce that to your members ahead of time, so they can prepare. And/or you may wish to facilitate online voting at a branch meeting. Since online voting requires only a Survey Monkey link (not individual log-in code), all you need is a computer with WIFI.
- 3. Print the <u>paper ballot</u> for members without email and/or don't use a computer. Please remind them that their completed ballot must be postmarked by April 13, 2024, to be counted.

Encourage your members to vote. Announce voting at every branch meeting and in newsletters throughout February 23, 2024, and 11:59 pm on April 30, 2024.

CEDAW for Allegheny –

Allegheny Gender & Equity Ordinance Review

The Public Interest Law Association (PILA) at Duquesne University has reviewed the existing audits and the associated Ord. No. 29-09, Article 1016 Gender and Race Equity Audit that has aspects of CEDAW. A Duquesne University Law student is completing his internship with us. He has reviewed the county ordinance that has been in place for a decade. A formal report will be coming soon.

This following information is taken directly from the ARTICLE 1016, Gender and Race Equity Audit, [Added 7-1-2009 by Ord. No. 29-09] § 5-1016.01. Purpose. The gender and race equity



audit shall be a detailed analysis of payroll data by the gender and race of employees and of human resource policies and practices to identify where gender and race pay differences and gender and race pay issues exist. A pay equity audit is an important first step in addressing workplace gender and race issues, as it provides information and data specific to the County workforce. After undertaking a pay equity audit, the County will be better able to identify where gender and race pay inequities exist within the workplace and can then adopt strategies to remove barriers to workforce participation and career progression for all employees.

Identifying those areas where there are larger than average gender and race pay gaps can facilitate the development of targeted pay equity strategies. The following chart is a comparison of New Hires by Job & Gender from 2015 and 2019 audit.

Earth Day The Theme for Earth Day 2024 is Planet vs. Plastics.

"The word environment means what surrounds you. In the case of plastics, we have become the product itself – it flows through our blood stream, adheres to our internal organs, and carries with it heavy metals known to cause cancer and disease. Now this once-thought amazing and useful product has become something else, and our health and that of all other living creatures hangs in the balance," said Kathleen Rogers, President of EARTHDAY.ORG. "

Plastics extend beyond an imminent environmental issue; they present a grave threat to human health as alarming as climate change. As plastics break down into micro-plastics, they release toxic chemicals into our food and water sources and circulate through the air we breathe. Plastic production now has grown to more than 380 million tons per year. More plastic has been produced in the last ten years than in the entire 20th




century, and the industry plans to grow explosively for the indefinite future.

Holidays And Festivals In The Month Of April



It's hard to believe that April is already around the corner. Whether you're mapping out your calendar around a <u>family vacation</u>, looking for the best weekend for a spring <u>trip</u>, or you're simply curious about the unique national days in April, Here are some dates in April that may be of interest.

- 1. **Passover (Date varies)** A Jewish holiday that commemorates the liberation of the Israelites from slavery in ancient Egypt.
- 2. **Earth Day (April 22nd)** A Day dedicated to raising awareness about environmental issues and promoting environmental protection.
- 3. **Anzac Day (April 25th)** A National Day of Remembrance in Australia and New Zealand that commemorates the members of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps (ANZAC) who fought at Gallipoli in Turkey during World War I.
- 4. **National Arbor Day (Last Friday in April)** A Day dedicated to planting and caring for trees. It is observed with tree-planting events and educational programs about the importance of trees.
- 5. **International Dance Day (April 29th)** A Day to celebrate dance as an art form and to promote its importance in culture and education.
- 6. **National Tartan Day (April 6th)** A Day to celebrate Scottish heritage and the contributions of Scottish Americans to the United States.
- 7. **Patriots' Day (Third Monday of April)** A holiday commemorating the battles of Lexington and Concord, which were the first battles of the American Revolutionary War. It is primarily observed in Massachusetts and Maine.
- 8. Administrative Professionals' Day (Usually the Wednesday of the last full week in April) A Day to recognize and appreciate the work of administrative professionals, such as secretaries, receptionists, and administrative assistants.
- 9. **National Park Week (Usually the third week of April)** A week-long celebration of America's national parks, with special events and programs organized by the National Park Service.

Diversity Month takes place in April every year. It was initiated in 2004 to recognize and honor the diversity of the world around us. It is a time to recognize and understand our differences, be it gender, race, ethnicity, faith, sexual orientation, and other factors, while honoring the common essence of humanity. The Heinz History Center's major new exhibition, *A Woman's Place: How Women Shaped Pittsburgh*, opens Saturday, March 23!

The exhibit takes an unprecedented deep dive into the lives of the fierce and unflappable Western Pennsylvania women who helped change the world through more than 250 artifacts, immersive experiences, and striking archival images.

Exhibit highlights include:

- Clothing and textiles from the 1830s through today, including the inauguration dress worn by Sophie Masloff – the first and only female mayor of Pittsburgh – and costumes from the National Negro Opera Company
- Original sketches from Peggy Owens Skillen, who helped to create the modern version of the iconic PBS show "Sesame Street"
- Protest posters, buttons, and other objects that tell the story of women's suffrage and how Pittsburghers like Lucy Kennedy Miller and Winifred Meek Morris fought for the right to vote
- A special section on athletes featuring a Team USA jersey signed by McKeesport native Swin Cash's Olympic teammates; Suzie McConnell Serio's WNBA jersey; and a leather baseball glove used by Betsy Jochum of the South Bend (Ind.) Blue Sox of the All-American Girls Professional Baseball League, on loan from the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History

The exhibit will be on view through Oct. 6, 2024. Stay tuned for more information on public programs, exhibit tours, and other happenings.


