It's happening here in Pittsburgh': Pennsylvania ranks 9th in new cases of human trafficking. It's happening here in Pittsburgh. It's happening in the communities around the city. It's a lot more prevalent than I think people realize. So many people don't know what human trafficking looks like.

Living in Liberty is one of the organizations that works to combat human trafficking in Southwestern PA by supporting survivors on the streets and in our safe homes as well as providing community education about the realities of commercial sexual exploitation in our city. Their work is supported by their Repurposed Thrift Store and is sustained by the efforts of over 150 faithful volunteers

Elizabeth Echevarria is the founder and CEO of Living in Liberty, a Pittsburgh-based nonprofit focused on providing services for victims and survivors of sex trafficking in Western Pennsylvania. Elizabeth is an amazing warrior with a servant's heart. She became interested in the issue of sex trafficking over a decade ago when she lived in the D.C. metro area. Living in Liberty was founded in 2012 by Elizabeth Echevarria to restore dignity, freedom, and a new life to victims of




Morning Book Group THE RIVER WE REMEMBER by William Kent Krueger



On Memorial Day in Jewel, Minnesota, the body of wealthy landowner Jimmy Quinn is found floating in the Alabaster River, dead from a shotgun blast. The investigation falls to Sheriff Brody Dern, a highly decorated war hero who still carries the physical and emotional scars from his military service. Even before Dern has the results of the autopsy, vicious rumors begin to circulate that the killer must be Noah Bluestone, a Native American WWII veteran who has recently returned to Jewel with a Japanese wife. As suspicions and accusations mount and the town teeters on the edge of more violence, Dern struggles not only to find the truth of Quinn's murder but also put to rest the demons from his own past.

Caught up in the torrent of anger that sweeps through Jewel are a war widow and her adolescent son, the intrepid publisher of the local newspaper, an aging deputy, and a crusading female lawyer, all of whom struggle with their own tragic histories and harbor secrets that Quinn's death threatens to expose.

When Hollywood auctioneer Emsley Wilson finds her famous grandmother's diary while cleaning out her New York brownstone, the pages are full of surprises. The first surprise is, the diary isn't her grandmother's. It belongs to Johanna Bonger, Vincent van Gogh's sister-in-law.

Johanna inherited Vincent van Gogh's paintings. They were all she had, and they weren't worth anything. She was a 28 year old widow with a baby in the 1800s, without any means of supporting herself, living in Paris where she barely spoke the language. Yet she managed to introduce Vincent's legacy to the world.

The inspiration couldn't come at a better time for Emsley. With her business failing, an unexpected love turning up in her life, and family secrets unraveling, can she find answers in the past?

National:

CEO Gloria Blackwell was interviewed regarding: What Happens if the Education Department Is Dissolved?

The problem: <u>Bill S.5384</u> was introduced in November to the 118th Congress calling for the Department of Education's abolishment.

Why it matters: The department plays a critical role in protecting civil rights, providing financial aid, and supporting students with the greatest needs. Its elimination would jeopardize funding for low-income schools, special education programs, and make higher education a riskier bet for students. Watch the viewpoints for more updates

How did Women Candidates Fare in the 2024 Pennsylvania Elections?



In our Congressional races, two seats changed hands, from Democratic to Republican. One of those losses was by a woman, Susan Wild, who was replaced by a man. Our Pennsylvania delegation now consists of ten Republicans to seven Democrats, including four women out of the 17, down from five. All four are Democrats.

In the US Senate race, Sen. Casey conceded, switching the seat from a male Democrat to a male Republican.

You already are aware that for President, the male candidate defeated the woman candidate for the second time.

The picture in our Pennsylvania Legislature is brighter for women, particularly when considered over time.

In the Pennsylvania Senate, 18 of the 50 members are women, evenly split at nine per party, for a total of 36%. Democrats added one woman to move up to nine members, which is 40.9% of the 22 Democratic Senators. Republicans' nine seats account for 32.1% of their 28 members.

In the Pennsylvania House, Republicans hold 101 seats. After this election, they have two less women, dropping from 27 to 25 seats, for a current 25.7% of their caucus. Democrats have 102 seats, maintaining their one seat majority. One woman moved from the House to the Senate, and another did not run again, but two new women won, keeping Democratic women's numbers at 36 seats, for 35.3% of their caucus. A woman, Joanna McClinton, is Speaker.

According to Represent, an organization dedicated to supporting women Democratic Legislative candidates, the percentage of Democratic women members of each body has doubled in the last 10 years that Represent has been active. In 2014, women held 16 of the Democrats' 92 seats, for 17.9%. In 2014, women held only four of the Democratic Senate seats, for 14.8%.

In these worrisome times, we should remember that persistence pays off.

The Spring La Roche Literary Society Presentations

The La Roche University Literary Society invites the community to two engaging presentations led by distinguished authors and historians this spring.

These free events offer an opportunity for guests to engage in scholarship, discussion and a deeper exploration of literary and historical topics. Both presentations will be hosted in the Ryan Room of the Zappala Campus Center at La Roche's campus in McCandless Township.



Feb. 7 at 7 p.m. Carleton Young: "Voices from the Attic: The Williamstown Boys in the Civil War"

Author and historian Carleton Young has spent over a decade unearthing the story of two Civil War soldiers after discovering an enormous collection of letters in his family attic. In his book, "Voices from the Attic: The Williamstown Boys in the Civil War," Dr. Young shares the remarkable story of two brothers who served in the celebrated Vermont Brigade within the 6th Corps of the Army of the Potomac. This presentation will explore the surprisingly detailed and insightful letters that preserved the brothers' personal histories as well as a powerful narrative of the Civil War.

Dr. Young has undergraduate degrees in economics from Westminster College and in English from Point Park University, a Master of Arts in history from Ohio University and his Ph.D. in the history of education from the University of Pittsburgh. For 37 years he taught AP American history at Thomas Jefferson High School in Pittsburgh. He also has taught classes as an adjunct professor at the Community College of Allegheny County, the University of Pittsburgh, Eastern Gateway Community College and in the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Carnegie Mellon University.

April 4 at 7 p.m. Thomas White '97: "The Witch of the Monongahela: Folk Magic in Early Western Pennsylvania"

Award-winning author Thomas White '97 will discuss his book, "The Witch of the Monongahela: Folk Magic in Early Western Pennsylvania." This presentation will explore the legend of Moll Derry, a woman said to possess mysterious magical powers in the hills and hollows of Fayette County, Pennsylvania. Known as the Witch of the Monongahela, she has captivated writers and folklorists for over two hundred years and is featured in tales like the Lost Children of the Alleghenies and Polly Williams and the White Rocks.

Mr. White is the university archivist and curator of special collections at Duquesne University. He is an adjunct lecturer in Duquesne's History Department and an adjunct professor of history at La Roche University. He is the author of several books chronicling and preserving Pennsylvania's folklore, legends and obscure history.

The Literary Society, initiated at La Roche in the early 1980s, serves as a forum for scholarship and discussion on literature and related issues, fostering a vibrant exchange of ideas and community engagement. The upcoming presentations continue the Society's tradition of offering opportunities for dialogue and learning.

For the Love of Books


This fiscal year's fundraiser *For The Love Of Books* is scheduled for May 31, 2025.


