### **BLACK HISTORY MONTH**

The 2025 Black History Month theme is "**African Americans and Labor**", touching on the invaluable contributions of African Americans in the workforce.

This year's theme highlights the significant contributions of African Americans in the workforce throughout history. From the time of slavery to the present day, Black people have played a crucial role in shaping labor and work experiences in the United States.

The 2025 theme, African Americans and Labor, focuses on the various and profound ways that work and working of all kinds – free and unfree, skilled and unskilled, vocational and voluntary – intersect with the collective experiences of Black people. Indeed, work is at the very center of much of Black history and culture.


2025 marks the 100-year anniversary of the creation of Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters and Maids by labor organizer and civil rights activist A. Philip Randolph, which was the first Black union to receive a charter in the American Federation of Labor. Martin Luther King Jr. incorporated issues outlined by Randolph's March on Washington Movement, such as economic justice, into the Poor People's Campaign, which he established in 1967. For King, it was a priority for Black people to be considered full citizens.

The theme, "African Americans and Labor," intends to encourage broad reflections on intersections between Black people's work and their workplaces in all their iterations and key moments, themes, and events in Black history and culture across time and space and throughout the U.S. Such new considerations and reconsiderations are even more significant as the historical forces of racial oppression gather new and renewed strength in the 21st century.



#### Morning Book Group THE HEAVEN & EARTH GROCERY STORE by James McBride



This Is a novel by American writer <u>James McBride</u>. It was released in 2023 to critical success. The novel tells the story of Black and Jewish residents of the Chicken Hill neighborhood of <u>Pottstown</u>, <u>Pennsylvania</u>, in the 1920s and '30s. It's a story about people who are struggling and their ambitions, successes and disappointments. In this compassionate, life-affirming and often funny novel, McBride explores what it means to be in a community and to live at the margins of "white" America".

### Evening Book Group THE WAGER by David Grann



On January 28, 1742, a ramshackle vessel of patched-together wood and cloth washed up on the coast of Brazil. Inside were thirty emaciated men, barely alive, and they had an extraordinary tale to tell. They were survivors of His Majesty's Ship the Wager, a British vessel that had left England in 1740 on a secret mission during an imperial war with Spain. While the Wager had been chasing a Spanish treasure-filled galleon known as "the prize of all the oceans," it had wrecked on a desolate island off the coast of Patagonia. The men, after being marooned for months and facing starvation, built the flimsy craft and sailed for more than a hundred days, traversing early 3,000 miles of storm-wracked seas. They were greeted as heroes.

But then...six months later, another, even more decrepit craft landed on the coast of Chile. This boat contained just three castaways, and they told a very different story. The thirty sailors who landed in Brazil were not heroes—they were mutineers. The first group responded with countercharges of their own, of a tyrannical and murderous senior officer and his henchmen. It became clear that while stranded on the island the crew had fallen into anarchy, with warring factions fighting for dominion over the barren wilderness. As accusations of treachery and murder flew, the Admiralty convened a court martial to determine who was telling the truth. The stakes were life-and-death—for whomever the court found guilty could hang.



PA's 2025-2026 General Assembly was sworn in on January 7. The first vote in both House and Senate was for procedural rules that govern how the chambers operate. Past rules have contributed to gridlock and division. Past sessions have accomplished very little when compared to other states.



Leaving Lawmakers Out - Each chamber of the General Assembly is controlled by a handful of caucus leaders and committee chairs that have the power to stop or delay a bill from receiving a committee hearing or a committee vote or from being brought to a floor vote by the full chamber. For various reasons, the vast majority of bills that are introduced in each session never become law.

Leaving Voters Out - How is this small group of caucus leaders and committee chairs able to retain so much control? Their grip on the legislative process is almost guaranteed to continue, despite their role in blocking constructive legislation for which many Pennsylvanians, regardless of party affiliation, have voiced support. These legislators know that the most effective way to ensure long-term incumbency is through gerrymandering—drawing the boundary lines of legislative districts in ways that are likely to produce the greatest number of votes for them in each election.

Our Future - The 2030 census may seem like an event that's too far in the future to contemplate right now. However, any change in the process requires a constitutional amendment that must be passed by the General Assembly in two consecutive legislative sessions. So, in anticipation of the 2030 census, a constitutional amendment authorizing a fair redistricting process would have to be approved in the Pennsylvania legislature's 2025-26 session and again in the 2027- 28 session. Without a fundamental change in the redistricting process, gerrymandered legislative districts could re-emerge as the norm for Pennsylvania after the 2030 census, once again leaving citizens without the ability to meaningfully choose their legislators. It does not have to be this way.

## Equal Pay Day - March 5, 2025.

**Equal Pay Day** is the symbolic day dedicated to <u>raising awareness</u> of the <u>gender pay gap</u>. In the United States, this date symbolizes how far into the year the average median woman must work (in addition to their earnings last year) in order to have earned what the average median man had earned the entire previous year. The exact day differs year by year.

In the United States, the average wage gap for women also varies by demographic and therefore also has different dates to recognize how far into the year an average woman of color needs to work to earn what the average man earned in the previous year without accounting for job type, education, etc.

## The Spring La Roche Literary Society

Carleton Young: "Voices from the Attic: The Williamstown Boys in the Civil War" Feb. 7 at 7 p.m. La Roche University in the Ryan Room of the Zappala Campus Center

Author and historian Carleton Young has spent over a decade unearthing the story of two Civil War soldiers after discovering an enormous collection of letters in his family attic. In his book, "Voices from the Attic: The Williamstown Boys in the Civil War," Dr. Young shares the remarkable story of two brothers who served in the celebrated Vermont Brigade within the 6th Corps of the Army of the Potomac. This presentation will explore the surprisingly detailed and insightful letters that preserved the brothers' personal histories as well as a powerful narrative of the Civil War.



Dr. Young has undergraduate degrees in economics from Westminster College and in English from Point Park University, a Master of Arts in history from Ohio University and his Ph.D. in the history of education from the University of Pittsburgh. For 37 years he taught AP American history at Thomas Jefferson High School in Pittsburgh. He also has taught classes as an adjunct professor at the Community College of Allegheny County, the University of Pittsburgh, Eastern Gateway Community College and in the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Carnegie Mellon University.

## **Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) What's Next**

The **Equal Rights Amendment (ERA)** is a proposed amendment to the United States Constitution that would explicitly prohibit sex discrimination. It is not currently a part of the Constitution, though its ratification status has long been debated.

President Joe Biden announced Friday January 17, 2025 that the Equal Rights Amendment should be considered a ratified addition to the U.S. Constitution, making a symbolic statement that's unlikely to alter a decades-long push for gender equality.

It is long past time to recognize the will of the American people," Biden said. "In keeping with my oath and duty to Constitution and country, I affirm what I believe and what three-fourths of the states have ratified: the 28th Amendment is the law of the land, guaranteeing all Americans equal rights and protections under the law regardless of their sex."

Presidents do not have any role in the amendment process. The leader of the National Archives had previously said that the amendment cannot be certified because it wasn't ratified before a deadline set by Congress.

The Equal Rights Amendment, which would prohibit discrimination based on gender, was sent to the states for ratification in 1972. Congress set a deadline of 1979 for three-quarters of state legislatures to ratify the amendment, and then extended it to 1982.

But it wasn't until 2020, when Virginia lawmakers passed the amendment, that 38 states had ratified it. The archivist said Congress or the courts must change the deadline to consider the amendment as certified. It is now up to the courts and congress.

We still have a long way to go. I would like to thank all members that called, texted, send emails, letters or post cards to President Biden in regards to the ERA




#### **GO RED**


