There are impacts—positive and negative—associated with our actions. We all make choices, including what we eat, what we buy and where and how we live our lives. As population increases, we are using resources at a rate faster than they can be replenished. But we can make choices that improve the quality of life, health and well-being of all people and the planet.

If demand exceeds supply, then the region runs an ecological deficit, which means that we're using more than can be replenished. If supply exceeds demand, then the region runs an ecological surplus. According to these analyses, the United States' demand requires a supply of 4.97 Earths. Gabriel Marshall, Sustainability Manager at Phipps Conservatory, the world leader in sustainability will be our speaker in April.



Here are **four** important things we would like you to know regarding the website, and the renewal process for this year:

- 1) This year the renewal campaign begins April 1st the target closure date June 30th, 2025. PLEASE try and renew BEFORE June 30th! And since our branch of AAUW has been fortunate to have added 5 new members in the past few months, we are able to offer 2 paid National Dues!
 - We will be raffling these 2 memberships at our April meeting Wednesday, April 16th!
- 2) National dues are \$72.00, having just been increased by \$2.00. Pennsylvania state dues remain the same at \$12.00, and local dues remain the same at \$31.00. Thus the total is \$117.00.
- 3) If you are interested in getting on to the website, here are the steps to follow:
 - -Log on to AAUW.org and read the directions for entering your email and your password. This will take you to a screen that will ask you to verify your address and information before hitting the button to renew.

National Dues Increase

Your Voice made a difference; National AAUW had proposed an annual increase in dues of \$5 per year for the next five years. During the comment period members through- out the country wrote in protest of such a large increase. Your voice was heard. There will be dues increase but not as substantial

What's happening: The AAUW Board approved a modest dues adjustment, <u>\$2 per year over the next two years</u>. Starting April 1, 2025, individual member dues will be \$74. On April 1, 2026, dues will change to \$76.

Why it matters: Member dues are an important funding source for AAUW. While costs for member support increase annually, member dues have not kept pace. The Board's decision to increase dues by \$2 allows AAUW dues to keep up with inflation and continue supporting the important work of AAUW.

The national part of your member dues help fund our work such as:

- **Education & Advocacy:** Member dues help support AAUW's public policy and member advocacy programs, which are now vitally important to defending higher education and rights for women on campus
- **Member Trainings:** Our regular virtual member gatherings and training programs provide education and engagement on several relevant topics
- **Member Engagement:** We organize member-led groups and committees like Archives Corps, Lobby Corps, and national committees, and coordinate AAUW's member advocacy through 2-Minute Activist
- **Real-Time Support:** Connect Team provides daily assistance to members
- And more!

The bottom line: The dues increase balances AAUW's financial sustainability with the member feedback we received. Thank you for all you do as an engaged member of AAUW!

What is an Executive Order?

- ➤ EOs are directives from the President that explain how that administration plans to interpret and enforce the law.
- Executive orders cannot override laws or case law interpreting those laws.
- Any action the president directs the federal government to take must be based on an existing statute or a constitutional power of the president.
- > An executive order is not law. An executive order that directs the executive/agency to act beyond what is allowed by those statutes and powers is unconstitutional.

An Invitation To Attend, AAUW PA Western District Meeting

The Save Act and Its Impact On Women

A renewed <u>Republican</u> push to pass the Safeguard American Voter Eligibility (SAVE) Act has put voting rights in the spotlight as <u>Congress</u> debates the legislation.

The **SAVE Act** (Safeguard American Voter Eligibility Act) is a legislative proposal that requires **citizenship documentation to register to vote**. The **League of Women Voters** opposes this Act, arguing that it imposes unnecessary barriers to voting, as voters are already required to affirm their citizenship status when registering. The Act is seen as a threat to voting rights, particularly affecting marginalized groups, including married women. Citizens are encouraged to contact their representatives to oppose the SAVE Act, which is viewed as a voter suppression bill.

It **passed** in July 2024 with a recorded vote of 221 - 198, but it was never **passed** by the Senate. In January 2025, as a new legislative session started, the bill was reintroduced in the House of Representatives as H.R. 22. The **SAVE Act** is currently pending review by the House of Representatives.

Why should you care?

For many Americans, primary proof of citizenship is their birth certificate. If an applicant's birth certificate doesn't match their legal name — or if an applicant doesn't have proof of citizenship at all — they may have to produce additional documentation to vote under the SAVE Act.

Research suggests up to 34% of voting-age women don't have documents with their current legal name proving citizenship and more than 9% of Americans don't have readily available documents proving citizenship.

Please let you legislators know how you feel about this bill.

Diversity

Why Diversity Is Really Our Greatest Strength


There is so much misconception and misunderstanding about diversity

Diversity is a good thing, when we understand how it works.

Diversity leads to <u>innovation</u>. Simply put, each one of us—due to how our minds are wired, our experiences, and our worldview—has a particular lens through which we see and analyze situations and others around us.

Many organizations find that diversity of culture and diversity of thought promote innovation, allowing them to unearth ideas that execute new ways of thinking and behavior.

Because of diversity, teams or communities can better problem-solve. There are more minds who can see a situation from different perspectives and help minimize groupthink and biased conceptualization. Bias isn't just due to racial or social biases; it can come from simply having limited experience.



For example, someone who is raised on a farm may have a different view than someone raised in a city. As such, when there is diversity of thought and people, it can help better understand the impact of a policy or action on all people involved.

Another of diversity's strengths is the assurance of equity. Like taxation with representation, you can ensure all voices are heard and share input on both the benefits and consequences of a decision. How can you create a policy or law without getting a wide range of input on its impact on the people it governs?

Diversity is not just about race, religion, or other social dynamics but about being equitable, transparent, and minimizing disproportionate experiences or realities where overrepresentation or underrepresentation is prevalent. In short, diversity helps decentralize power, resources, and opportunities in the best interest of all beings.






Exercise Your Civic Right: Voting is one of your rights as a citizen, and you should seriously consider exercising this precious right by voting in the coming elections.

Great Decisions 2025 Rap-Up

Our Great Decisions program had another wonderful season! We had six excellent sessions with good attendance, great speakers, and interesting discussions. Our 2025 schedule included:

Session #1 – Saturday, February 1^{st} , 2025 - "U.S. China Relations" with speaker Dr. Mark Haas, Duquesne University (attendance 60+)

Session #2 – Saturday, February 8th , 2025 - "International Cooperation on Climate Change" with speaker Dr. Danielle Falzon, Rutgers University (attendance 55+)

Session #3 – Saturday, February 15th, 2025 - "American Foreign Policy in the Middle East" with speaker Professor Ross Harrison, University of Pittsburgh (attendance 55+)

Session #4 – Saturday, February 22nd, 2025 – "The Future of NATO and European Security" with speaker Dr. Soren Fanning, Robert Morris University (attendance 65+)

Session #5 – Saturday, March 8th, 2025 – "AI and American National Security" with speaker Professor Sohel Sarwar, La Roche University (attendance 69+)

Session #6 – Saturday, March 15th, 2025 – "American Foreign Policy at a Crossroads" with speaker Dr. Soren Fanning, Robert Morris University (attendance 58+)

Our Great Decisions team had three major goals for the 2025 season, and all of our goals were met:

- 1) Explore six of the eight topics offered by the Foreign Policy Association with speakers.
- 2) Continue to offer the program in hybrid form, allowing for an expanded audience and reach for speakers. I have included at least one speaker from outside of Pittsburgh for the past 4 years and have a goal to increase the weekly attendance. Our attendance this year averaged 61, an increase over last years average of 54. We have come very close to doubling our Great Decisions audience from 2022 when we brought the program back after a Covid hiatus and averaged 32+.
- 3) Continue to place a "tip jar" in the room to cover the cost of technology support. This year we collected \$395.00 which not only covered our tech support but also covered the cost of the teacher "kit" we need to purchase in order to share the videos, and articles, with our speakers.


