





## Great Decisions, Great Season!

Our 2026 season of Great Decisions has come to an end. As I write this article, there is only one session remaining. Our branch of AAUW North Hills Pittsburgh has sponsored this wonderful program for almost 45 years. It has grown throughout the years. It began as the Foreign Policy Association intended, as a kitchen table discussion group. It has since grown into a classroom experience to include members of the community and speakers to discuss the various topics designated annually by the Foreign Policy Association. This year, our attendance has reached an all-time high, averaging 56 attendees per session. We have enjoyed having long time attendees, as well as previous members of AAUW, join us through Zoom.

Our sessions for 2026 have been:

- 1) **"U.S.-China Relations Trade Rivalry"** - a discussion focused on both security motives as well as the tariff situation.  
Dr. Mark Haas, Duquesne University -Saturday, February 7th, 2026.  
**(This session was rescheduled for Saturday, February 28<sup>th</sup> due to severe weather.)**
- 2) **"America and the World: Trump 2.0 Foreign Policy"** - a discussion that explored the implications of a potential return of Trump to the presidency and how it may reshape U.S. foreign policy as well as the world order as we currently know it.  
Professor Ross Harrison, University of Pittsburgh -Saturday, February 14th, 2026.
- 3) **"Ruptured Alliances and the risk of Nuclear Proliferation"** - a discussion focused on the consequences of weakened alliances & the implication for global security, specifically in regard to nuclear weapons.  
Dr. Soren Fanning, Robert Morris University -Saturday, February 21st, 2026.
- 4) **"U.S.-China Relations Trade Rivalry"** - a discussion focused on both security motives as well as the tariff situation.  
Dr. Mark Haas, Duquesne University -Saturday, February 28th, 2026.  
**(This session was rescheduled from Saturday, February 7th.)**
- 5) **"U.S. Engagement of Africa"** - a discussion focusing on Africa's growing geopolitical role, comparing U.S. and Chinese presence, and the tools of statecraft the U.S. might use to strengthen ties.  
Dr. Innocent Badasu, University of Pittsburgh – Saturday, March 7th ,2026.
- 6) **"Ukraine and the Future of European Security"** - a discussion focused on the ongoing conflict in Ukraine and its effects on European security and the role of the United States.  
Dr. Soren Fanning, Robert Morris University - Saturday, March 14th, 2026.
- 7) **"The Future of Human Rights and International Law"** - a look at the future of global cooperation amidst shifting power dynamics and rising nationalism.  
Mark Lagon, Chief Policy Officer at Friends of the Global Fight - Saturday, March 21st, 2026.

I am most grateful for the generosity of our speakers, several of whom have become friends of the program. They believe in the importance of communities being informed and engaged. The time and expertise of the speakers, that has been so graciously shared, has elevated our discussions and our perspective going forward.






## Earth Day 2026





